What Parents Need to Know About Juuling

One of the biggest topics right now in high school parent newsletters everywhere is the Juul. It's a popular e-cigarette system that looks a lot like a USB flash drive—you may have seen one in your teenager's room, figuring it contains an essay on *The Great Gatsby*. Based on Twitter and Instagram posts with the hashtag #doit4juul, students are "juuling" wherever, whenever—in school bathrooms, in libraries and under their desks in class. They're getting away with it because the device is discreet, the "cloud" can be hidden in a sleeve, and the vapor smells sweet and fruity, unlike cigarette smoke. Among teens, e-cigarettes are more popular than traditional cigarettes, and the Juul brand is currently king.

School administrators are trying to crack down on juuling. One Miami counselor confiscates two Juuls per week. A district in Pennsylvania has banned on campuses in an attempt to get rid of the confusion. A principal in D.C. felt the Juul problem was becoming so bad that he took doors off the bathroom stalls.

Here is what parents need to know about the e-cig of the moment:

The Juul consists of a long, slim vaporizer and disposable "pods" of nicotine juice. The pods come in flavors such as mango, creme brulee and cucumber. Some call the Juul the "iPhone of vapes" because of its sleek and minimalist design. It charges on a laptop or other USB port.

How Does It Work?

The device heats the nicotine juice to create vapor, which is inhaled by the user.

Who Is It Intended For?

Juul describes itself as "a mission-driven company seeking to eliminate cigarettes by providing a true alternative for adult smokers." The company states on its website that Juul is "not appropriate or intended for youth, former smokers, or never smokers." To purchase Juul products on the official website, JUULvapor.com, you must be 21 and go through an age verification process. In stores, you must be of the legal age to buy a tobacco or nicotine product in your state. But teens are finding ways to get them, such as using fake IDs, buying them on unregulated websites or knowing of a lax gas station attendant.

What Does It Feel Like to Juul?

One anonymous 15-year-old describes it like this:

The first time was in the lunchroom. Everyone else was hitting it and I was like "alright, I want to try that." I guess I knew there was nicotine in it, but I had no idea that it had so much. When I hit it for the first time it was, like, really crazy. I felt a really big buzz off of barely anything.

It hurt my throat more than anything else I've done. I hit it and coughed immediately. At first it was just fun and it was something that you could do anywhere. It's so easy. Then it just became something I was doing nonstop, but I still felt a buzz. Now, I go crazy if I don't have it. I don't even feel a buzz anymore.

Jack Waxman, a high school senior in New York who's working to spread awareness about the dangers of teenage Juul usage, says he's seen friends all go down the same path: First, they're attracted by the "fun flavors" and enticed by the head-rush. But then, after using the Juul for a while, they feel no rush at all. "They use the device to make their body feel normal again, just like any smoker," Waxman says. He's seen people "struggle to make it thirty minutes without taking a hit."

Attention Parents...

How Much Nicotine Does It Contain?

Each pod has about the same amount of nicotine as a pack of cigarettes, or 200 puffs. Specifically, the nicotine concentration is 59 mg/mL per pod, which can be more than double that of other vaping products. It gives users a strong, fast punch.

How Dangerous Is the Juul for Those Underage?

For adults, vaping is generally believed to be a healthier alternative to cigarettes because it doesn't burn tobacco and release carcinogens. (Under FDA regulations, Juul "cannot and does not make any claims that its products are less harmful or safer than cigarettes.")

But no e-cigarette product should ever be considered "safe," especially not for those underage. Teenage brains are still developing, so they're uniquely vulnerable to addiction. Nicotine is very addictive, and exposure to nicotine in adolescence has been shown to have long-term impacts on brain development. It may affect teens' behavior, concentration, memory and their ability to learn.

There are other health concerns for young people who vape. According to a study published in the American Journal of Respiratory and Critical Care, adolescents who use e-cigarettes are twice as likely to suffer respiratory symptoms such as a persistent cough, bronchitis, congestion and phlegm as those who don't. And there's some evidence that shows teen vapers are more likely to take up smoking tobacco cigarettes than non-vapers.

How Can You Tell if Your Teen Is Juuling?

Signs of general e-cigarette use include increased thirst (the propylene glycol in the devices can cause dry mouth), a new sensitivity to caffeine and possible nosebleeds.

It's important to start a conversation with your teens about e-cigarettes, whether you suspect they are using them or not. With the Juul, you might open with a general, nonthreatening question—"Hey, I just read about this thing. What have you heard about it?"—and see what they say. Explain the serious health risks of e-cigarettes (remember phlegm, nosebleeds, lung problems, a messed-up brain, and addiction, just to name a handful). If your son or daughter is vaping, let them know that you do not approve, and work with them to replace the unhealthy behavior with a positive one. E-cigarettes contain more than fun, fruity flavors, and when teenagers use them, there may be lasting consequences.



Prom 2018

Notre Dame High School Prom 2018

The Junior/Senior Prom will be held on **Saturday, May 19, 2018** at **Iococca Hall at Lehigh University-Mountain Top Campus**. The doors will open at 5:30 p.m. and the Prom will end at 10:00. A sit-down dinner will be served at 6:15 p.m. It is necessary for all guests to arrive **no later** than 6:00 p.m. We **insist** on this timetable.

Any behavior not conducive to the well-being of your son or daughter and the reputation of your family and our school before or during the prom will result in disciplinary action. We have breathalyzers available that per our school handbook may be used for the safety of our students. The use of alcohol and other drugs is absolutely forbidden. Any indication that any form of alcohol or other drugs has been used or supplied by your son/daughter or his/her date, before or during the prom will result in the following action:

You will be called immediately to pick up your son/daughter and date.

After a conference with the parents and administration, appropriate disciplinary action will be taken.

PLEASE keep in mind that your attire for the evening should reflect a certain level of school appropriateness and modesty for a high school prom. Plunging necklines are not allowed. Appropriate lengths and material are expected. Jewelry that includes visible body piercing, other than earrings, is not allowed. No visible tattoos are allowed. Dress for boys is a tuxedo. No sneakers or inappropriate footwear. Earrings are acceptable. All boys must be clean-shaven. Jackets and bow ties may be removed after dinner-nothing else may be removed. Any guests who ignore this code will be asked to leave the prom. We ask your compliance in this matter to avoid unpleasant situations for both the school and the noncompliant party.

If your date is a non-Notre Dame student, he/she **MUST** complete the guest form. **NO GUESTS IN MIDDLE SCHOOL OR JUNIOR HIGH OR GUESTS OVER 20 YEARS OF AGE WILL BE PERMITTED.** Please follow the instructions. Guests must have a guest form signed by the Principal, Assistant Principal, or Dean of Students from his or her school. If the guest is out of high school, he or she is required to have the appropriate signature from the school from which he or she graduated. The guest must also sign the Memo of Understanding.

The price for the prom is \$150.00 per couple or \$75.00 for a single. This includes a sit-down dinner, prom favors, decorations, and music. **Tickets will be sold from April 4 to April 20.**

Before your son or daughter purchases a ticket, all community service hour commitments, retreat commitments, and financial obligations (tuition, fees, etc.) to the school must be met. A signed Memo of Understanding must be presented at the time tickets are purchased. Absolutely no tickets will be sold without the proper paperwork.

Christmas City Photography will be available to take prom portraits.

Thank you in advance for your cooperation and support. We know that the prom experience will be one of the highlights of your son/daughter's high school days.

Kairos Retreat



Kairos is a four day retreat offered in the spring and fall of senior year for Notre Dame students. It takes place at a beautiful retreat house with expansive grounds for walking and reflecting. The time spent on the retreat is divided into small group discussions, large group discussions, talks, meals, prayer, and Mass. The three main points of Kairos are developing the relationships with yourself, with others, and with God. Many students form bonds with people outside of their immediate friend groups. Students also come to experience an inner peace by talking through things and getting stuff off their chests. Deeper relationships with God also form. Kairos is really the first time young adults may actively choose to incorporate Christ into their daily lives rather than being forced to by their parents. From the perspective of a senior, this retreat is a great time to break away from the stress of the final year of high school and to return to school with a clearer and refreshed mindset. It

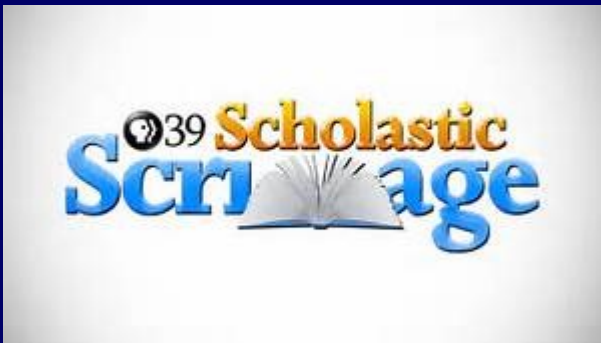

Seniors- Class of 2018

College Acceptances

A big CONGRATULATIONS to all our seniors who have been accepted to the colleges they've applied. We'd like to share the good news via Notre Dame's Facebook page. Feel free to bring your acceptance letter, along with any apparel you may have from that school, to the Guidance Office for a quick picture and post.

Update your Family Connection Account

Don't forget to update your "Colleges I'm Applying to Page" in Family Connection. Indicate the admissions decision at each school you've applied (accepted, denied, waitlisted, etc..) under the "Results" column. Also, if you know which college you're attending, update the "College Attending" section. To log into Family Connection visit

If you need your login information, please contact the Guidance Office immediately.

Final transcripts

When students update the "College Attending" section in Family Connection, the Guidance Office will know where to send final transcripts. *If this is updated, final transcripts will be automatically sent to that institution as soon as they are available.*

Most colleges use May 1st as their deposit deadline. Usually this deposit is a non-refundable payment that indicates your commitment to attend that school. Colleges may extend this deadline beyond May 1st if you make a request to do so. If you change your mind about a college, in some cases, the colleges may provide a refund if the request is made in writing.

Juniors- Class of 2019

On the morning of Tuesday, May 8th all Juniors will take the ASVAB here at Notre Dame. The ASVAB is a vocational aptitude battery designed to assess students' strengths and abilities and how they may apply to certain careers and occupations. This test does not affect grades or gpa whatsoever. It is used as a career assessment tool, as a detailed score report provides occupational compatibility to a number of different areas. An informational brochure will be passed out to Junior students in homeroom 2 weeks before the test.

Save the Date- September 27, 2018- Financial Aid Presentation

Michael Burke, our regional representative from the Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency (PHEAA) will provide a free financial aid workshop for parents of seniors. For students who will graduate from ND in 2019 and begin college in the 2019-20 school year, the FAFSA can be completed starting October 1, 2018. To help parents understanding this process, Mr. Burke will go over the FAFSA application for federal, state and local financial aid.

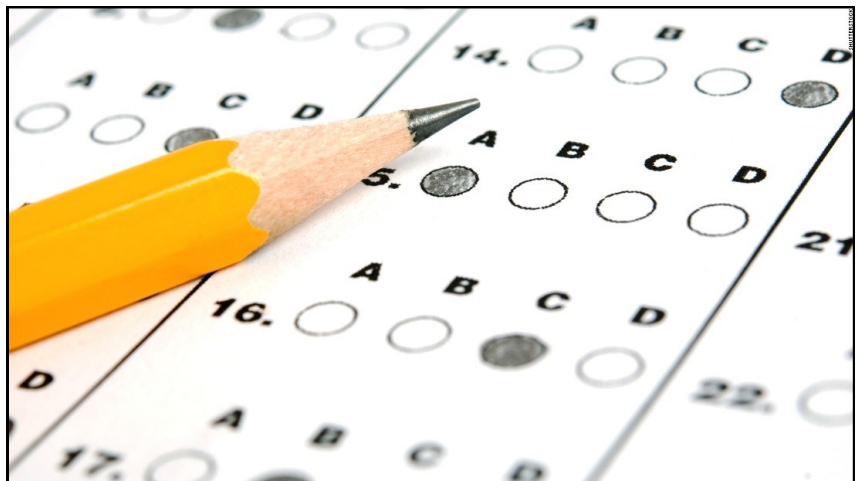
