
I will always remember the lessons teachers have taught, the people I have met, and the nights we all danced at prom and homecoming as a family.

Free speech

Elon's Motives in Buying Out

Twitter

Elon Musk will soon be the owner of the social media giant Twitter. The social media company recently announced that it has accepted the Tesla and Space Ex CEO's \$44 billion offer to take the company private. That means the world's richest man is about to have the power to develop an entire social media platform used by more than 200 million people every day. Musk intends to use this power in a few specific ways.

His first proposal is to loosen up content rules in the name of free speech. Musk describes himself as heavily pro free speech and has criticized what he sees as excessive moderation on online platforms.



"Free speech is the bedrock of a functioning democracy, and Twitter is the digital town square where matters vital to the future of humanity are debated." E. Musk

Musk's next goal is to create an edit button so users can change their tweets. Unlike other social media apps, it is not possible to change the content of tweets on Twitter once it's published by a person. Musk has said he supports letting people change what their tweets say although it is coming with much controversy.

The Tesla CEO also aspires to open up Twitter's algorithm to the public. Musk has said that the software that determines what people see and how widely content spreads on Twitter should be cracked open. He supports placing Twitter's algorithm on GitHub, a site popular with programmers for sharing computer code.

Lastly, Musk plans to launch a war on twitter bots and scams. Combating the tons of bots on Twitter fake accounts that are programmed to respond to tweets on certain topics is another change Musk favors. Musk's business empire has been known to attract its fair share of bots. In addition, many speculate that Musk will open the platform back up to former President Donald Trump. Musk has not publicly said whether he would allow former President Donald Trump back on the platform after the company permanently suspended him for comments that supposedly broke their rules of conduct during the U.S. Capitol siege last January.

Twitter's Motives to be Sold

Science tells us that with every push comes a pull of opposite force to that same degree. Translating this law into business, we understand that if Musk's motive for buying out Twitter was that of rebranding and promoting free speech-related ideals, Twitter must also in turn have a motive to being bought out. Twitter's CEO, Jack Dorsey, co-founded the app all the way back in 2006.

He envisioned it as a public platform made to create a community-like online hub for users to efficiently share their views, communicate with each other, and post about relevant topics. Facing much controversy and upheaval however, Dorsey stepped down from the official CEO title in 2021, leaving the job to the interim Parag Agrawal but still retaining 2% of Twitter in stock value. Around this time, Twitter is still resting as a predominant social media powerhouse. However, it's most successful year was 2014, when Twitter reached its climax of annual revenue growth.



Being at an ALL-TIME low in 2020, Twitter clearly had to go through some rebranding. In spite of all these efforts, their numbers in 2022 simply did not compare to that of its 2014 era. Seeing this, we can form a logical correlation between Twitter's agreeing to be bought out and their low engagement. For example, if Twitter had been at a record high in yearly growth in 2022, Agrawal might not have agreed to sell it to Elon Musk. The low growth might reflect society's current outlook on Twitter, behind the controversy surrounding the issue of freedom of speech in social media. Moreover, if we look back at Dorsey's removal, he still owns 2%, which may not seem like a high amount but in actuality its estimated worth is over \$978 million. So, with a substantial profit to be made from selling it and left with no real indication that Twitter's stock will ever rise to that of its early 2010's heights, the leaders of Twitter made the consensus to sell it, leaving Dorsey to make roughly 1 billion dollars! Had none of those factors existed, Musk might not have even wanted to buy Twitter in the first place! Thus, it is the amalgamation of both Elon's motivation, Twitter's self recognition that they were on the decline, a last chance for profit, and political upheaval that resulted in Musk's purchasing of Twitter!

Lastly, NDTC is one big family and we can not wait for our family to expand in the new auditorium next year!





Notre Dame senior Cris Cucciuffio plays lacrosse for Moravian Academy as a goalie with over 315 saves for this season. <u>On April 12, 2022, he recorded 45 saves in a single</u> <u>game, beating the previous Pennsylvania record of 31.</u> To Cris, playing lacrosse is a matter of family pride. "I have fun doing it, and it means a lot to me because my whole family does it." He chose the sport because, as he put it, "I grew up playing it since I was a little wee baby." Ultimately, Cris would like to play for the Premier Lacrosse League (PLL), but first he will play for Saint Bonaventure University where he also plans to major in accounting.

ND swimming has now had its fourth successful season thanks in large part to the efforts from senior R.J. Farina. 

He says that his wrestling and academics benefit each other, saying "The mindset we develop in school and in wrestling helps me in both." Holden looks forward to the summer, but is excited to return to school as a senior next year.

Senior wrestler Evan Maag had 43 wins in his 2021-22 season, the most on the team. He set a record by being ND's first ever 4 time district champion. He has an entertaining reason for starting wrestling: "I was basically a hot-headed kid, I wanted to fight people, so I ended up doing that...I fell in love with the sport." Evan says that being around the same group of people for as long he has — the coaches and athletes — has been a particularly meaningful part of his sport. He also credits wrestling with helping him get into a good college. Next year, Evan will attend George Mason University in Fairfax, Virginia where he will continue to wrestle. Ultimately, his goal is to place in the NCAA All-American wrestling tournament.

We are sure that, although they have done great things already, all of these incredible athletes have even brighter futures ahead, whether it's with the Crusaders or elsewhere.
